## **TEMPORARY COMMISSIONER TIM GODWIN OBE, QPM, LONDON METROPOLITAN POLICE**

Tim was educated at Haywards Heath Grammar School, Warsash College of Nautical Studies, then later at the University of Portsmouth (BA Hons in Public Sector Police Studies) and Cambridge University (Diploma in Applied Criminology).

At the age of 16, he joined the Merchant Navy where he spent 6 years and achieved the rank of second mate, the Navigating Officer of the ship. He joined Sussex Police in September 1981 and achieved Superintendent rank in January 1992. As a Superintendent, Tim performed the roles of Head of Personnel and Divisional Commander for a large Operational Command Unit, which included Crawley New Town. In 1996, he was appointed Force Crime Manager for Sussex, responsible for Force Level Intelligence, Crime and Drug Operations, Scientific Support and Major Crime Investigations. Following successful completion of the Strategic Command Course he was appointed as Commander Crime in the Metropolitan Police in 1999. He was promoted to Deputy Assistant Commissioner in 2001 and Assistant Commissioner Territorial Policing in January 2003.

During his time with Territorial Policing, Tim introduced, in partnership with the NHS, a number of 'Havens' in London where victims of serious sexual assaults can receive medical and psychological support in a non-police environment. He was also instrumental in creating the role of PCSO and oversaw the rollout of safer neighbourhood teams in every ward in London 9 months ahead of schedule.

He is the ACPO lead for Criminal Justice and also the chair of the London Criminal Justice Board. Combining these two roles, he works in partnership with Government and other criminal justice agencies to pursue the reform of the criminal justice system to provide a speedier and effective delivery of justice.

He received the Royal Humane Society Testimonial in 1991 for rescuing a man from a high bridge over a railway line. He was awarded the runner up prize for Equal Opportunities Achievement in the Police Service by the Home Secretary in 1996. In 1998 he was awarded the National Prize for Public Management Leadership by the Office for Public Management.

He attended the Cabinet Office Top Management Programme in 2004 and in October 2007 was part of a senior team asked by the Cabinet Office to undertake a capability review of HM Customs and Revenue.

Tim was awarded the OBE in the Queen's New Years Honours List 2003 and the Queen's Police Medal in the New Year's Honour's list 2009. On 16 July 2009, Tim was appointed Deputy Commissioner Metropolitan Police by HM The Queen.



### **SIR DAVID VENESS CBE, QPM CHAIR, LONDON FIRST SECURITY & POLICING ADVISORY BOARD**

Sir David Veness served as Under-Secretary-General of the United Nations Department of Safety & Security from its creation in 2005 until June 2009. The role carried responsibility for UN operations globally. Prior to this appointment, he was Assistant Commissioner (Specialist Operations) New Scotland Yard from 1994-2005.

He joined the Metropolitan Police as a cadet in 1964 and as a constable in 1996. In the course of his police career he specialised in serious crime investigation, hostage negotiation and counter terrorism. David was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge (MA, LL.M) and attended the Royal College of Defence Studies in 1990. Sir David was awarded the Queen's Police Medal in 1994, a CBE in 2000, and was knighted in 2004.

Sir David is the Chairman of London First's Security & Policing Advisory Board



### **HAGAI SEGAL, LECTURER & COUNTER TERRORISM ANALYST NYU LONDON**

Hagai M. Segal is an award winning academic, consultant and analyst, specialising in the Middle East and Asia, radical Islamism/modern terrorism, and geo-strategic and economic risk – specifically developments in terrorism, the Middle-East and Asia, radical Islamism/modern terrorism, and geo-strategic and economic risk.

Segal has a long track record as a consultant, analyst and advisor to numerous banks, finance/investment houses, international corporations, business groups, security and police agencies and politicians across the globe.

He specialises in analysis of geo-strategic and economic risk factors – specifically developments in terrorism, the Middle-East and Asia, and developments in US Foreign Policy – and how these factors affect global and regional security and the global economy.

In his academic role, Segal lectures in Near and Middle-Eastern politics at New York University In London, has previously taught at the University of London, and guest lectures at Universities across the globe from the USA to Australia.

He is the 2007/8 recipient of NYU London's Annual Teaching Award.

He has additionally participated in Israeli-Palestinian peace talks.

He is a member of London First's Security & Policing Advisory Board since its creation in 2008.



## **NICHOLAS L. PROTO , VICE PRESIDENT & CHIEF INVESTIGATOR, NEW YORK FEDERAL RESERVE BANK**

Nicholas L. Proto is Vice President and Chief Investigator in the Enforcement and Litigation Division of the Legal Group of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. He is responsible for all investigations conducted by the Enforcement Division to ensure compliance by institutions and individuals with applicable laws and regulations. These investigations cover a wide variety of matters, ranging from money laundering and other complex financial crimes, to terrorism, major fraud cases, cyber crime, employee misconduct and other internal matters.

In addition to these duties, Mr. Proto serves as the highest ranking police official in the New York Fed's force of over 100 certified Federal Law Enforcement Officers. This federal police force derives its authority from legislation known as the USA PATRIOT Act, which was enacted as an anti-terrorism measure in the wake of the events of September 11, 2001.

In implementing the authority conferred by that legislation, the New York Fed conducted training, administered examinations, and certified each of the officers in the force as Federal Law Enforcement Officers. Under Mr. Proto's supervision, the force provides around-the clock security for the persons, property and assets at all of the New York Fed's facilities, including the largest repository of gold in the United States and billions of dollars worth of cash, coin and food coupons. This federal police force safeguards highly sensitive and confidential information pertaining to the New York Fed's role as part of the Central Bank of the United States, and is in direct contact with other federal, state and local law enforcement officials regarding issues of public safety.

Mr. Proto also oversees and is responsible for the New York Fed's Frauds and Scams website, which educates the public with respect to known "Federal Reserve" scams and other fraudulent financial schemes and broadcasts law enforcement warnings in an effort to prevent and deter financial crime.

Mr. Proto joined the New York Fed in September 1997. Prior to joining the New York Fed, Mr. Proto was Director of Investigations at Kroll Associates, an international private investigative firm. Before that, he served as Inspector General in various government agencies and was the Head of the New York State Tax Enforcement Division. Mr. Proto is retired from the New York City Police Department, where he handled various investigative assignments, specializing in white collar crime, organized crime and corruption cases.



### **CARIE LEMACK, CO-FOUNDER, GLOBAL SURVIVORS NETWORK (GSN)**

Carie Lemack is the co-founder of Global Survivors Network (GSN), a global organisation for victims of terror to speak out against terrorism and radicalization. Since launching GSN in November 2009, she has coordinated and inspired events in Jordan, Pakistan, and Indonesia, produced an award-winning documentary film *Killing in the Name*, spearheaded a website, [www.globalsurvivors.org](http://www.globalsurvivors.org) and generated interest and coverage in media outlets worldwide.

Ms. Lemack co-founded and led the non-profit, non-partisan organization Families of September 11 after her mother, Judy Larocque, was killed on AA Flight 11 that terrorists crashed into the World Trade Center.

Carie received a masters in public administration from the Harvard Kennedy School of Government in June 2006 after receiving an MBA from Stanford University Graduate School of Business in 2004. She graduated from Stanford University in 1997 with a bachelor of science degree in symbolic systems. She is a visiting fellow at the Center on Global Counterterrorism Cooperation, a term member at the Council on Foreign Relations, and a lifelong member of Red Sox nation.



### **EMILY LANDIS WALKER, SENIOR STAFFER, 9/11 COMMISSION**

Emily Landis Walker has worked in many prominent positions within financial services, government and humanitarian agencies globally and is acknowledged for her contributions to national and international initiatives. Her hallmarks include strong global relationships within both private and public sectors and an instinctive track record in devising and realising innovative strategies to deliver market performance, humanitarian efforts and public impact.

Emily is currently working on private sector development and investment in Iraq. Emily serves as a Distinguished Visiting Fellow at the Homeland Security Institute and is a Member of the US Department of Homeland Security Private Sector Senior Advisory Committee. She serves on the Executive Advisory Committee of the Global Roundtable, guiding the establishment of the Global Risk Network at InterCEP. She was instrumental in the creation of PS-Prep Private Sector Standards for Emergency Preparedness. From 2009 to 2011, she was a member of the Department of Homeland Security Quadrennial Review Advisory Committee. She serves on the Advisory Board to London First's Security and Resilience Network, and is a member of US Technical Assistance Group to ISO - TC 223, assisting in the formulation and development of international standards for societal security through emergency and crisis management.



## **DON W. RANDALL MBE, DIRECTOR OF SECURITY, BANK OF ENGLAND**

Don Randall served with the City of London Police from 1969 to 1995, specialising in investigations with specific emphasis on fraud and counter terrorism. He left the police service at the rank of Superintendent where he spent four years as Deputy Head of the Fraud Squad and three years in the Operational Support Department. He was the senior ground commander during the 'Bishopsgate Bomb' and was integral in the formulation of many of the counter terrorist measures employed by the City of London and, in particular, what is known as the 'Ring of Steel'.

Don was Managing Director at JP Morgan Chase, which he joined in 1995, and held the post of International Security Manager and had responsibilities for corporate security, fire life safety, technical and card access, investigations, health and safety, pre-employment screening, due diligence and all other security-related issues for Europe, Middle East and Africa and the Asia Pacific regions.

In August 2008, Don assumed the role of Head of Security at the Bank of England.

Don is chairman of the 'Sister Banks', the City of London Crime Prevention Association and 'Project Griffin' (a joint partnership between the private and public sector security industries), a member of the City of London Crime and Disorder Reduction Panel; the London Resilience Business Forum and Implementation Group, and sits on various expert panels relating to the prevention, deterrent and detection of terrorist and other criminal activities.

Don Randall is also an external lay member of the City of London Police Committee. He is the Vice Chairman of the Child Victims of Crime charity and a trustee of two other law enforcement/ public related charities. Don was awarded the MBE in 2007 for services to law enforcement involving the harmonisation of the public and private sector agencies.



## **BILL RAISCH, INTERCEP, NYU**

William G. Raisch is the founding Director of the International Center for Enterprise Preparedness (InterCEP) at New York University, established with initial funding from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. InterCEP is the world's first academic research center dedicated to private sector risk management and resilience.

His work at InterCEP focuses on real world impact with an emphasis on the development of actionable strategies and policies through active collaboration with key private sector stakeholders and a holistic approach to risk management and resilience. The Center's research activity focuses on achieving objectives in uncertain environments with insights from the areas of risk management, strategic planning and innovation.

Mr. Raisch served as private sector preparedness advisor to the U.S. Federal 9-11 Commission and assisted in developing the Commission's recommendations on private sector emergency preparedness. He has over 30 years of experience in the private sector, spanning roles in both private and public corporations.

Mr. Raisch serves as a Fellow at the U.S. Chamber of Commerce National Chamber Foundation, focusing on identifying emerging issues that will impact the business community in the future. He is a member of the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee of the American National Standards Institute (ANSI), a Principal Member of the Technical Committee on Disaster/Emergency Management & Business Continuity (NFPA 1600) and a member to the U.S. Technical Advisory Group to the ISO Technical Committee on Societal Security. He serves on the Advisory Committee of Experts for ANAB – the accrediting body for the voluntary Private Sector Preparedness Program (PS-Prep). He also serves as the emergency manager for his home town, the Village of Asharoken, New York.

Mr. Raisch received his B.A. (Government & Economics) and M.B.A. from Cornell University.



## **MICHAEL BERKOWITZ, COO, CORPORATE SECURITY, DEUTSCHE BANK**

Since December 2010, Michael Berkowitz has been the Chief Operating Officer of Corporate Security, Business Continuity (CSBC) and Operational Risk Management for Deutsche Bank. In this position, he has responsibility for budgeting, operations, and global coordination across the group's six workstreams. He also serves as the head of the Bank's Protective Intelligence unit, designed to assess and analyse security and geo-political threats to the Bank, its staff, processes and information. He is a member of the CSBC Executive Committee.

Prior to that he was the CSBC head for the Asia-Pacific region with responsibility for all business continuity planning and alternate site operations, as well as physical security, executive and event protection, fraud investigation and prevention and cyber crime. The Bank has a presence in 17 countries throughout the region with hubs in Hong Kong, Singapore, Sydney and Tokyo.

Until January 2005, he was Deputy Commissioner at the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) in New York City. In this position he worked on major planning initiatives, including the New York City Coastal Storm, Biological Terrorism and Transit Strike contingency plans.

At OEM he led an initiative to create OEM's Public-Private Emergency Planning Initiative and its Ready New York citizen preparedness campaign.

During his tenure at OEM, he responded to the 1999 outbreak of West Nile Fever, Tropical Storm Floyd, major flooding in Southern Queens (1999), the crashes of SwissAir 111 and American Airlines 587, the 2003 Northeast Blackout, as well as the 2001 anthrax incidents and the World Trade Center disaster.

Prior to his arrival at OEM in March 1998, he was the editor of Emergency Preparedness News, a Washington, DC-based newsletter for emergency management professionals.

Michael is married with a son named Oliver who is five years old. Michael's hobbies include basketball and cycling.
